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#### 116th Assault Helicopter Company 269th Combat Aviation Battalion APO 96353

#### I GENERAL:

a. During this quarter (1 January through 31 March 1967), the

116th Assault Helicopter Company was located at Cu Chi (home of the 25th

Infantry Division) approximately 20 miles NW of Saigon. The organization

Lained as prescribed in TOE 1-77E, dated 15 July 1963,

as amended by GO 200, Third United States Army, dated 12 July 1965, GO 237,

Hq, Third United States Army, dated 6 August 1966, and GO 283, Hq, Third US

Army dated 9 September 1966. On 19 March 1967, the 116th Assault Helicopter

Company was transferred from the 11th Combat Aviation Battalion to the 269th

Combat Aviation Battalion in accordance with GO 7, Hq 12th Aviation Group.

There has been no significant change in either the mission or the structure of the regularly attached units: the 283rd Signal Detachment, the 392rd

Transportation Maintenance Detachment, or the 431st Medical Detachment throughout this quarter. The current organizational structure is as depicted in Appendix I.

b. The mission of the 116th Assault Helicopter Company as indicated in TOE 1-77E is to (1) provide tactical air movement of combat troops in an airmobile operation; and to (2) provide tactical air movement of combat supplies and equipment within a combat zone.

#### & ADMINISTRATION:

a. Strength: Due to the requirement for experienced personnel in ther units, coupled with the history of uneven rotation experienced by the 116th, this period was characterized by an unusually high degree of personnel turbulence. The rotation problem is depicted in Appendix II. These facts and figures that a balance was generally achieved between gains and losses; howserious training problem was encountered by this unit during this peras a result of the massive and rapid rate of turn-over of personnel.

The unit's aviators we coped with the problems by initiating a judicious and energetic training program for new pilots during the conduct of assigned missions. In addition, standardization rides are frequently given by the unit IPs in order to insure the highest legree of proficiency in all aircraft commanders and pilots. In appendix III is a list of Officers/Warrant Officers who have arrived or departed this organization during this quarter. The list accurately represents the turbulence encountered during this dynamic period of time.

b. Key Personnel: In Appendix IV, a roster of key personnel by month for the quarter is depicted. The most significant personnel changes were the replacement of the unit commander and the First Sergeant. Major Jamos H. Patterson was replaced by Major Harold I. Small at an impressive change of command ceremony conducted in the unit area at 1500 hours, on 4 February. Among those present were Colonel Dibble, Deputy Brigade Commander, lst Aviation Brigade; Colonel Campbell, 12th Aviation Group Commander; and LTC Starker, llth Combat Aviation Battalion Commander.

The other important command position change was the replacement of First Sergeant E7 Ted M. Group by First Sergeant E7 Victor R. Byrer.

- c. <u>Promotions:</u> Many officer and enlisted personnel of this unit were recipients of well described promotions during this quarter. In Appendix V is a listing of those who were promoted. Also included in this appendix are two individuals, 2LT James T. Jackson and 2LT Anthony V. Hutson, who received direct appointments as commissioned officers from warrant status.
- d. Awards and Decorations: Many awards for both meritorious service rechievement and valor were received by personnel assigned to the 116th Assault helicopter Company during this quarter. Listed in Appendix VI is a campilation of all awards received. Of significance and a source of great Pride to the organization is the fact that two Distinguished Service Crosses (awarded to Major James Patterson and Cpt Rolla Breed), five Distinguished Flying Crosses, two Silver Stars, two Bronze Stars and twenty-four Purple Hearts were presented during this period. As indicated, numerous Air Medals and Army Commendation Medals (including several with the coveted "V" device) were awarded.

The volume of awards, as noted below, is indicative, to a great degree, for the outstanding support rendered by the 116th Assault Helicopter Company of the outstanding with which the assigned missions were conducted.

e. <u>Unit Area:</u> Many improvements and additions have been made to the company area to include: The erection of an Officers Club and EM Club; construction of wooden sidewalks throughout the area encompassing the living quarters and operational buildings; renovation of drainage canals; and construction of various athletics and recreational facilities (basketball courts, volleyball courts, horseshoe ritching court, and movie screen.) In addition, the flight line had its face lifted with the construction of sand bag bunkers around the aircraft parking PSP's, personnel bunkers, and a new tech supply building.

#### III. OPER TIONS AND TRAINING:

- a. General: During the last quarter the lifth Assault Helicopter Company participated in every important operation in the III Corps area, including Operations Cedar Falls, Junction City, and Gadsden. Letters of commendation and words of praise were received from many sources and the unit was recommended for the Presidential Unit Citation for one action. In Appendix VIII is listed the operational historical data for this past quarter.
- b. Training: Aviation has again been a highlight among the numerous operational duties. We received many new replacements during the quarter and in addition trained 9 pilots from the ith Division's Aviation Battalion, the 269th Combat Aviation Battalion and the 187th Assault Helicopter Company. The company has also had two officers from the VNAF for transition and training in the UH-ID. This was handled in addition to a vigerous standardization pro
  - c. Operational Highlights: The following are highlights of signifi-

cant operations conducted by the 116th Assault Helicopter Company during the last quarter.

On 22 January 1967 WO Piper and WO Harrington were attempting a medevac mission for the 5th Special Forces in the Duc Hoa area (XT 507006) when
they were hit by enemy ground fire as they were taking off. WO Fiper was
wounded in the right eye and the aircfaft received four hits. WO Harrington
who had only been in country four days, took control of the aircraft and such
denly lost all dydraulics, and the transmission ril pressure failed. He flet
the aircraft about a mile to a relatively open area where he set it down.

All were evacuated and WO Piper was later returned to CONUS because of his
wounds.

On 23 Jan 67 the Mornets were called on to support four different units with combat assaults for each. They supported the 199th Inf Bde, 5th and 25th ARVN Divisions, and lst Bde, lst Inf Div. The coordination and timing involved in conducting CA's for four wide-spread units was monumentous, but the Hornets again came thru with compliments from all four units.

On 28 Jan 67 the Stingers accumulated their largest body count for one ter while supporting the 199th Inf Bde (Lt) (Sep) near Mha Be. After a heavy prep on an LZ, ground troops confirmed 7 VC KIA (body count). Later three VC sampans were sunk and three more KIA's were added to the count. Still later the enemy was found withdrawing from a tunnel complex and after the Stingers had worked the area over nine more VC KIA's were confirmed.

The 116th Assault Helicopter Company set an all time record during the month of January for total hours flown by an airmobile company in the 11th

Combat Aviation Battalion. The Hornets marked one year in combat by flying a total of 3048 hours in January. In accomplishing this record, the 116th flew in support of every major US unit in the III Corps and supported MACV, USAID, FFVII, 1st ATF and numerous ARVN uhits.

Significant achievements were: conversion of all pressure-type hydraulic systems to the gravity-feed system, thus eliminating many maintenance problems; the maintenance of over 80% availability over the quarter; and receipt and issue of new tool boxes to the mechanics and crew chiefs.

## (5) Problem Area

he detachment has not received maintenance float or test equipment needed in support of the new VOR and ADF ratio sats.

The problem exists in turning in test equipment for maintenance and it not being returned for periods of six months or, in some cases longer, imposing mission limitations upon the detachment.

To date the detachment still has not been issued four (4) critical shortege pieces of test equipment plus numerous other items authorized by TO&E.

b. 392nd Transportation Maintenance Detachment:

## (1) Organization:

The 392nd Transportation Maintenance Detachment is organised under the provisions of TO&E 55-500R. The assets of the detachment (Appendix X) are divided couldly into two shifts to give continuous around-the-clock support to the unit.

Approximately 50 % of the unit's maintenance is accomplished during the night. The primary effort is placed on aircraft which can be made ready for 'missions by repairing strike damage and performing inspections.

The 431st Medical Detachment has actively participated in unit medical support activities and is currently planning its role in various civic action projects that are proposed.


